hile the semester was abruptly cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Gamma Chapter was still able to accomplish a lot before school closed, and we are managing to operate in a new and adaptive way, where we use this global crisis as a new direction for fundraising and philanthropy.

Brothers were involved in a Red Cross blood drive before school was closed. The brotherhood has already begun fundraising for COVID-19 relief, along with many other fraternities and sororities at the university, and doing our part in helping with what we can. Lately, brothers have taken both individual steps in fundraising and getting more people involved as a supportive community through social media.

We are proud to have another successful academic year of being above the university's all-fraternity GPA, earning a 3.23. Gamma Chapter has maintained its high ranking of excellent academics, with 33 brothers making Dean's List in the fall semester. As a response to the ongoing epidemic, the university's grading policy, like many schools around the country, has been changed to pass/fail. This helps students be more selective about what grades from this semester will impact their GPA.

Unfortunately, many events we planned for the spring semester are not happening now like spring formal, our annual Blue and White alumni tailgate, and parents weekend. We had a great Founder's Day call with alumni earlier this semester on February 8, which would have allowed us to have a better time at the planned tailgate in the spring with alumni.

Luckily, we still had THON. This year, we raised over \$100,000 with our partnered sorority, Phi Sigma Sigma, a huge achievement for us. VNR Membership Development

## HOUSE PROJECTS FORGE ONWARD VNR M&O REPORT

This year the brotherhood had 44 members living in our house during the fall semester, with slightly lower numbers for the spring term after many brothers decided to spend a semester abroad. The house is in good condition and currently still improving as the undergraduates have completed some projects and are still working on many others.

First, due to the increased number of brothers in the house, new benches were constructed for all the tables in the dining room so all brothers could sit and eat at dinner. We hired our new cook, Chef Chad, to cook these dinners as well, and most brothers agree his talent in the kitchen has been one of this year's most welcomed additions to the house.

Great hall saw the rebuilding of the crescent this semester, along with the repair of some older composites, allowing them to be displayed for the first time in years. Second floor was home to well over 20 brothers this year, many of whom worked to completely refurbish and update our social room, known to many as gamer, which has hosted many brotherhood events and birthdays since its completion. Third floor housed over 20 brothers for most of the year as well and saw its own improvements. Brothers worked to patch and sand any holes and dents in the hallway, then repainted the entire floor. Professional help was also brought in to repair the bathroom, which required attention due to a design flaw that pitched any water from the showers in the wrong direction. The brotherhood also has begun to construct a new group of brothers who will work under the VNR M&O and other executive members to increase accountability and appreciation toward our valued house.

## **Chapter Finances**

Finances for the semester were solid considering the effects of the pandemic. We decided to do partial refunds to brothers on their rent and dues. Although it is hard to part with money that could have otherwise been saved, we wanted to keep their families in mind and give as much back as we could. Fortunately, our alumni board has prepared us well for emergencies such as this, and we will be coming into next semester strong.

Next semester we have 29 brothers living in-house. Our rent prices are tiered based on grade, with seniors paying \$3,100 per semester, juniors \$3,300, and sophomores \$3,500. This compares favorably to the costs of living in the dorms at school. The average two-



person, renovated dorm is \$3,828 per semester.

Over the summer we also plan to work to refinish the house's hardwood floors and repair some cement work outside. The M&O and VNR Alumni Relations plan to create another house tour video prior to move in this summer, to follow up



the one created in February and showcase the new improvements.

## A MARRIAGE TO ENVY

en Ketterer '61 (Γ802) from Bucks County and Joann Buterbaugh from Indiana County met as undergraduates at Penn State in 1961. Ken majored in animal husbandry, was active in the Block and Bridle Club, and had just joined AΓP, pledging with the likes of Brothers William Buzby '61 (Γ818), Kenneth Dixon '61 (Γ811), Wallace Haulik '61 (Γ820), William O'Brien '61 (Γ804), Glenn Morrison '61 (Γ801), and Wilbur Avril '61 (Γ819). Some of Ken's favorite stories came from judging the Little All American at Penn State.

Upon both graduating in 1963 (Joann with honors), Ken asked Joann to marry him, and with that accomplished, they started working. Within a few years Ken found a job

working for the Eisenhowers on their farm in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, with the President's famous Black Angus cattle herd. Following that, Ken and Joann bought a farm in Newville, Pennsylvania, and named it Bourbon Springs. She got a job teaching home economics at Cumberland Valley and then at Shippensburg Area High School; they both worked for Penn State Extension, and Ken did market reports for the Pennsylvania Department of Ag. Ken judged the Little I many times for many years and was a regular attendee at the winter business meeting.

In his free time, Ken hunted and especially enjoyed going to Colorado for elk, mule deer, and buffalo. He shot a huge Buffalo in South Dakota on the ranch where the movie *Dances with Wolves* was filmed. First and foremost, Ken and Joann were farmers, raising cattle and hogs and in later years they crop farmed.

Their marriage lasted 54 years, until Joann passed away in 2017. Ken, born December 25, 1941, in East Rockhill Township, Bucks County, passed away January 7, 2020 at home in Newville. They spent their life together doing what they loved with the people they loved. Their lives well lived are an example for us all.

## THE 1966 FIRE Jim Kessler '66 (1905) Recounts That Fateful Day

In 1966, the chapter house burned from an electrical fire. The brothers were forced to relocate to a Nittany Halls until the house could be repaired. Only a few items inside were saved. The house's interior was soon rebuilt to its current state in 1968.

The newspaper says that there were two members living in the house at the time of the fire. I was one of those members. I am Gamma 905. Here is what happened.

I was sleeping on the second floor room closest to the stairwell over the TV room. I remember someone yelling "FIRE, FIRE" in the middle of the night. I thought I should get up and see what was going on.

The nonmembers were roomed on the third floor so I went to check on them. The hallway was filled with smoke down to about two feet off the floor where there was still some clean air. I crawled down the hallway checking each room. I found one person asleep on his bed. He was totally nonresponsive. I grabbed him by the collar and dragged him as I crawled back down the hallway to the stairway. As I continued dragging him down the stairs, he began to cough, gag, and resuscitate. By the time we got outside, he was breathing, and talking, sort of.

Then I was able to make a trip back to my room and get my books, supplies, and an armload of clothes for the next day. I was not able to make another trip because of the now intense heat. And by then the fire department was there. A year later we were able to back into the house for the fall term of classes.

## **A Family of Farmers** Matthew Strite Receives Grower Award

**atthew Strite**, partner/owner of Strite Apple Orchard in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, was presented the 2019 Outstanding Grower Award by the State Horticultural Association of Pennsylvania (SHAP).

SHAP President Chris Baugher, who presented the award during the annual Fruit and Vegetable Growers Banquet, said Matt was honored for his outstanding contributions to the tree fruit industry and the association.

The Strite family has been farming in the Harrisburg area since 1843. The first fruit trees and vegetables were planted by Joseph C. Strite in 1917. His son, Earl, would eventually join him in the business and over time expand the farm to over 250 acres.

Earl sold his produce at markets in the city of Harrisburg and door to door in nearby Hummelstown. In 1950, the original market was opened on the farm. Earl's sons, **Joe '65 (\Gamma889)** and **Tom '68** ( $\Gamma$ 933), joined their father on the farm and added greenhouse operations. All three received the honor of being named Master Farmers over the course of their careers.

In 1994, a new farm market and bakery were built and the farm was expanded to 300 acres. 2011 was the inaugural year for Strite's community supported agriculture (CSA) program that allowed business to deliver produce throughout the greater Harrisburg area to participating members.

Current family members actively involved on the far are brothers Joe and Tom, wives Sharon and Sheryl, and children Jonathan and Matt, who received the SHAP recognition at the banquet held January 28.
