Alpha Gamma Rho has impacted the lives of more than 1,500 young men at Penn State. Gamma members have exemplified the ideals of our Fraternity as leaders on campus, in the classroom, on Ag Hill, and as alumni through civic leadership throughout our country. Lifetime friendships, business and community contacts, social opportunities, and simply fond memories are all benefits of our ATP membership.

Our home at 322 Fraternity Row was built in 1929 and has served us well. However, it has withstood decades of use from active undergraduates and is in dire need of renovations and updates. Most of us lived in the chapter house as undergraduates, maybe taking for granted the hard work and dedication of our founding fathers and alumni to build and maintain our beautiful home. We knew when we joined ATP that upon graduation we would share ownership in the mansion on Fraternity Row.

With homeownership comes responsibilities—financial responsibilities. For more than two years, a vision-driven group of Gamma alumni has been working diligently to develop a solid strategy to renovate the chapter house. Their hard work has produced a comprehensive plan to provide our Fraternity with a first-class facility to ensure the legacy each of us helped build carries on. Most importantly, our alumni leaders and undergraduates have already raised more than \$400,000 toward a goal of \$1 million or more for the renovation of the house. With this strong early support, we are now thrilled to kick off a major capital campaign to fund a project that will make our house the standard on campus.

Along with the campaign, we want to let you know about some other exciting changes:

- Gamma is changing our Homecoming date for 2009. We are opting to meet on October 24, which is an away game weekend. Hotel rooms are more plentiful and definitely less expensive and the town will be less crowded. This will alleviate parking problems at the house, which is always an issue on Homecoming. See page 3 for the full details of this exciting new event for Gamma alumni.
- PSU Homecoming weekend (October 17) will consist of a catered tailgate in the Agriculture Arena parking lot. Food and non-alcoholic beverages will be provided courtesy of the alumni association. The

Campus Involvement

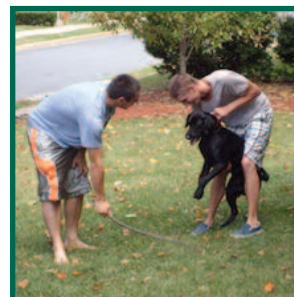

Bill Nichol '50 (Γ603) was one of four people honored by the National Dairy Shrine on October 2, 2008. He was recognized for his visionary leadership, which allowed Pennsylvania Holstein breeders to have many domestic and foreign merchandising opportunities. Bill was executive director of the Pennsylvania Holstein Association (PHA) from 1959 to 1997. During that time, he initiated programs and committees, grew membership of the organization to record numbers, and is credited for creating a model for other Holstein associations. Since his retirement, Bill was recognized by the PHA with the lifetime title of executive director emeritus. Bill resides in State College, Pennsylvania, with his wife, Lily. He is still active in Alpha Gamma Rho and holds a position on Gamma's Campaign Executive Board.

ALPHA GAMMA RHO IS THE REASON MY FAMILY EXISTS

Jesse Hallowell '97 (Γ1392)



Jesse Hallowell '97 (Γ1392) comes from a long line of Alpha Gamma Rhos dating way back to the 1930s. The more recent Hallowell brothers include Jesse's grandfather, **Penrose Hallowell Sr. '48 (Γ571)**; uncle, **Jim Hallowell '73 (Γ1026)**; and father, **Penrose Hallowell Jr. '73 (Γ1031)**. His Alpha Gamma Rho lineage is what inspired Jesse to donate to the capital campaign.

"It's very special to have a shared experience that spans from 1939 to 2009. I can talk to my dad and granddad about things no one else in my family experienced. Most significantly,

ΑΓΡ is where my grandmother met my grandfather, where my uncle met my aunt, and where my mother met my father. ΑΓΡ is the reason my family exists at all."

Continuing his family's legacy at Alpha Gamma Rho wasn't the only reason Jesse joined the fraternity. "I learned a lot about taking care of myself, my house, and my family while living at ΑΓΡ. For me, undergraduate school was 20% education and 80% experience. I think a lot of today's undergrads get too little life experience in college, in part because they spend all four years in dorms or apartments."

Immediately after graduation, Jesse went home to work on a dairy farm in Ottsville, Pennsylvania, and was a substitute teacher in Central Bucks School District. In 2002 he moved to South Philadelphia and took a job teaching middle school math for the School District of Philadelphia; he has been there ever since. This year Jesse is teaching eighth grade math at E. Vare Middle School.

He knows that leadership is essential for any organization, which is why he has volunteered his time as treasurer to the ΑΓΡ Alumni Association. On his leadership experiences, Jesse says, "I learned how to communicate with and organize people. I learned to lead by example. Communication is the most important skill a leader can master."

In his spare time, Jesse enjoys running long distances around Spring Garden and Kelly Drive in Philadelphia. He also attends about 10 Phillies games a year, spends time with his wife, Sunny, and their daughter, Jane-Hope, born January 15. He also keeps in touch with as many ΑΓΡs as possible. 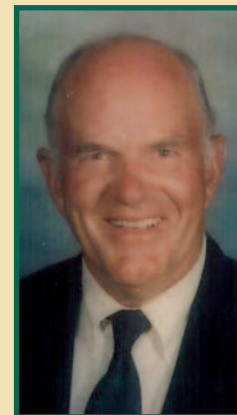

Bill grew up on the family farm and attended a small rural school. Thanks to loving and caring parents, he journeyed to Penn State University where he majored in agriculture economics. We pick up where we left off from the last time."

CHAPTER ETERNAL

Harold Doran '41 (T465) of Boalsburg, Pa., entered Chapter Eternal February 16, 2009, at home. He is survived by his second wife, the former Susan M. Frandsen, of State College. He was preceded in death by his first wife, the former Evelynne Miller of Wyalusing. In 1966 he accepted a position at Penn State as director of cooperative business education. He retired from Penn State in 1991, at which time the Hal F. Doran Cooperative Business Education Award fund was established to recognize an individual showing leadership and dedication to cooperatives, as Hal did during his career.

John Melchor '49 (T577) entered Chapter Eternal on September 18, 2008. He and his wife, Marjorie, had celebrated their 39th wedding anniversary on April 5, 2008. After college John worked for the Pennsylvania Agricultural Extension before returning to the family farm. He and his brother, Harold, owned and operated Bach Echo Farm in Williams Township, Pa., where John raised prize-winning Holstein dairy cows. He was awarded the distinction of Pennsylvania Master Farmer by the Pennsylvania State University Agricultural Extension Service in 1969 and was later employed by the Wilson Area School District and the Farm Service Agency of Northampton County. John is survived by his wife, Marjorie; his son, James; his daughters, Elizabeth and Louise; and his brother, Harold.
